The Washington Post

This Washington Post poll was conducted September 2-9, 2025, among a random national sample of 815 Jewish Americans. The sample was drawn through SSRS's Opinion Panel, an ongoing survey panel recruited through random sampling of U.S. households. The margin of sampling error is plus or minus 4.7 percentage points among the full sample.

The sample includes adults who identify as Jewish by religion as well as those who identify as adults with no religious affiliation but identify as Jewish in another way than religion (ethnically, culturally or through their family background) and were either raised Jewish or have a parent who is Jewish. The error margin is plus or minus 5.3 points among the sample of 634 Jews by religion and 9.9 points among the sample of 181 Jews of no religion.

Sample design, field work, data processing and weighting were conducted by SSRS of Glen Mills, PA.

METHODOLOGICAL DETAILS

This poll was sponsored and funded by The Washington Post. The poll includes a random sample of 815 U.S. Jewish adults. Interviews were conducted in English.

The questionnaire was administered with the exact questions in the exact order as they appear in this document. Demographic questions are not shown. Phrases surrounded by parentheticals within questions indicate clauses that were randomly rotated for respondents.

SSRS conducted sampling, interviewing and tabulation for the survey using the SSRS Opinion Panel, a representative panel of adults age 18 and over living in the United States. SSRS Opinion Panel members are recruited through probability sampling methods using address-based sampling.

Sample drawn for this study to target the adult population of Jewish Americans age 18+ were SSRS Opinion Panelists. Sample drawn was stratified by age, gender, race and ethnicity, education, Census region, and party identification, to ensure adequate representation of each demographic group. Sample was also stratified by religion, and all panelists who were known to be Jewish from profile data (either Jewish by religion or consider themselves Jewish - ethnically, culturally or because of their family's background) were pulled to maximize representation and sample size.

This survey uses statistical weighting procedures to account for sampling and deviations in the survey sample from known population characteristics, which helps correct for differential survey participation and random variation in samples. The sample was weighted to match population estimates for the demographic makeup of U.S. Jewish adults, with benchmarks from Pew Research Center surveys.

All error margins have been adjusted to account for the survey's design effect, which is 1.9 for this survey. The design effect is a factor representing the survey's deviation from a simple random sample and takes into account decreases in precision due to sample design and weighting procedures. Surveys that do not incorporate a design effect overstate their precision.
